proving a point

In a first for Australian and New Zealand backgammon, the ANZBGF will introduce a points system for live events to encourage broader participation and crown our best tournament player.

The new system will award points depending on the size and stature of the event, with the ANZBGF Championship, Australian Open and New Zealand Open on the highest of three tiers.

The state titles such as the time-honoured NSW and South Australian Opens, along with the Australian Masters and Australian Speed Championship will be on the second tier. The third-tier events will include the Newcastle Open as well as SA's Nick Begakis, Angie Hambour and Spring championships.

Points will be displayed at all live events included and will be updated regularly on the ANZBGF web page. The system will be launched at the Australian Open on the Gold Coast in November and run through to the end of 2024, after which they will run according to the calendar year.

the spirit of co-operation

The ANZBGF Championship organisers are joining forces with Simon Woodhead, who puts on the Australian Open each year, to award the winners of each event with automatic free entry to the other event.

ANZBGF president Shane McNally says the concept is a means of bringing the backgammon community together and encouraging cooperation between the country's two major events. He says he would welcome approaches from other Australian and New Zealand tournament organisers with similar initiatives.

Australian Open organiser Simon Woodhead has gone a step further, providing the winner of this year's online Eva Bitel Memorial Tournament with entry to the major event on the Gold Coast – all at his own expense.

the AGM

The ANZBGF AGM will be held via Zoom on Sunday, December 3. All members are welcome to be involved and are also eligible to nominate for a position on the board.

everyone is heading to the Coast

The Australian Open is going from strength to strength, with the big event being held at the luxurious Sofitel Hotel at Broadbeach on the Gold Coast on November 24-26. This year's event, which will require the use of clocks, will feature the Open, Masters and Speed Championship as well as several more auxiliary events to meet demand. Entry to the Open, which will be a double elimination tournament, is \$100. Organiser Simon Woodhead reports there has already been strong interest in the event and expects to run a 128-field Open. Buy backs are expected to make up some of those positions.

World Team doing us proud

The Australians playing in the 2023 WBIF World Team Championships are showing they're certainly not fazed by the elite quality of the opposition, after beating a Japanese side stacked with Grand Masters to advance to 15th position in a field of 72.

The team comprising Greg Kurrell, Mick Dyett, David McAllister, Martin Pikler and Malcolm Hutson, won 12 of its 25 matches at the mid-way point of the tournament. The event is seen as a great way for Australian and New Zealand players to get experience against the world's best players – and improving their games further. As for the Women's Team and the NZ Team, it's all good experience and there's always next year!

stalwarts in showdown

In what was widely regarded as a fitting finale, Cindy Belonogoff and Steve Roberts went head-to-head in the final of the Eva Bitel Memorial Tournament in October.

Two of the genuine stalwarts of Australian backgammon – he is a multi-tournament winner and she is a tireless worker who has finished in the money at the Monte Carlo World Championships – met in an online best of 3 final.

Steve took the first match before Cindy bounced back in the second to take the title to a decider.

The final was a long-hard match in which Steve got out to a clear lead and looked the likely winner – but Cindy's determined play allowed her to somehow fight back for a 13-10 victory.

Hossein dominates overseas tournaments

If there was any doubt about the credentials of Australia's regular number one player Hossein Haydari, he dispelled them by winning four tournaments in a short space of time in Turkey during October. Hossein was overseas visiting family when he saw they were running the inaugural Kusadasi Open at the Ephesia Resort Hotel and couldn't resist entering. While the reigning South Australian Open champion didn't win the main prize, he stormed to victory in four events and came away the owner of a brand-new championship board along with some very handy holiday spending money. In one of the tournaments, Hossein had to defeat a field of 128 players in the DMP single point event.

Hossein said it was a great experience competing against a wide variety of international players in a tournament overseen by world-renowned tournament director Arda Findikoglu.
